As an interfaith nonprofit organization, we are dedicated to sustaining one of the oldest museums in the world. Unlike other major collections, the Vatican Museums receive no tax revenue, and since 1983, the Patrons of the Arts in the Vatican Museums have worked to support ongoing restoration work so that the entire world can enjoy these priceless treasures. Since the time of Michelangelo and Raphael, the will to support an artistic legacy has always been at the heart of the Vatican's idea for humanity. The work of the Patrons enables the Vatican Museums to restore and conserve the works of art of the Holy See; to convey the cultural, spiritual, and historic patrimony of the Vatican Museums; and to improve, enrich, and expand the Vatican Museum's facilities and collections.

From massive architectural undertakings like the Gallery of Maps, the Sala Ducale, or the Bramante Courtyard, to fragile archaeological items like a 2500 year old bronze lituo (a type of ancient Etruscan wind instrument), to great works of Renaissance art and sculpture, the support of the Patrons is critical to the ongoing survival of these collections so that they can be seen by the whole world.

In 2022, dozens of California and Northwest Patrons traveled to Rome and took advantage of their membership benefits such as a docent-led tour of the Vatican Museums, as well as tours of the Papal Gardens and the Santa Rosa Necropolis, an extensive burial site for lower and middle class Roman citizens dating back to the time of St. Peter and earlier.

Under the expert and steady leadership of Sr. Raffaella Petrini, interim International Director of the Patrons and Secretary General of the Vatican City State, the North American and global Patrons network has never been stronger. With the Museums in Rome fully reopened, visitor counts surging, and the fortieth anniversary of the Patrons approaching in 2023, it's an exciting time to be a Patron!

VISUALIZING THE VIRGIN GETTY MUSEUM LOS ANGELES THURSDAY 01 DEC 2022

Two tours available (10:30am or 1:30pm), with all guests invited to a seated multicourse lunch at the Museum Restaurant (11:30am)

Vibrant, illuminated manuscripts depict stories of the Virgin Mary, attesting to her role as one of the most adored figures in the Christian tradition.

Join the Patrons for a curator-led tour of the Getty's new exhibition, "Visualizing the Virgin," on Thursday, December 1st. Select either a morning or afternoon tour, and gather with us for a lunch before or after your tour at the Museum restaurant.

The exhibition highlights the Virgin Mary's life, acts of miracles, and the interpretation of her image in the Middle Ages. The exhibition also explores the legacy of Marian imagery in the Americas, especially the Virgin of Guadalupe.

Visualizing the Virgin Mary is the first Getty exhibition to focus on the Virgin Mary since the exhibition *The Queen of the Angels* over two decades ago.
